

Naloxone




Near-fatal overdose

Information for you

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Why have I been given this leaflet?

We have given you this leaflet because you overdosed and were given naloxone by ambulance staff to reverse the effects of opiates and save your life.

We advise you to go to hospital following an overdose for further medical advice.

This leaflet describes what will happen, whether or not you choose to go to hospital.

What will happen?

If you are admitted to hospital, the Alcohol and Drug Liaison Team at University Hospitals Ayr or Crosshouse may contact you to offer assessment and onward referral for community support with your consent.

The Scottish Ambulance Service will alert local community alcohol and drug services that they gave you urgent medical attention.

They will do this so that you can receive further support for your health and wellbeing. This is also an opportunity for you to receive non-judgemental advice, support and treatment.

Staff will then contact you to arrange ongoing support at a date and time suitable to you.
